We are worried about the contract between the Scottish Government and all the Local Authorities in Scotland.



This is called the 'Verity House Agreement'.



Local authorities will be able to make decisions about social care support.



We want the decisions to be made for the whole of Scotland.

We should be part of the decisions that are about us.





We sent a report to the Scottish Human Rights Commission for the United Nations.











Our report said that things have got worse for disabled people.





We told the United Nations what disabled and deaf people told us about their lives.





We will help the Disabled People's Movement to build its leadership skills.

We met with the Minister Ben MacPherson MSP.





He launched the new Adult Disability Payment at our office.





We invited disabled people to tell him about what happens when they try to get benefits.

We talked about the benefit called the Adult Disability
Payment. We told
government what you said.

social care support, and


unpaid carers.






They worked hard on the proposed National Care Service (NCS).

We wanted everyone in Scotland to know about the barriers disabled people have.





We wrote answers to consultations.



Consultations are papers with plans for changes. We told decision makers what disabled people thought about their plans.






We told the government and the Scottish Parliament about what needs to change.





Poverty and the cost of living

Disabled people cannot pay for food or keeping warm.





Welfare and Social Security

Money from social security benefits is very important.

We asked for changes to be made to Scottish social security benefits

This means disabled people will have some more money.



We campaigned for the Scottish Child Payment to be raised to £25 a week.



We won.





The Job Grant helps young disabled people with working.





We asked for it to be opened to more young disabled people.



Social Care Support

We worked with disabled people to find out what they need from a new National Care Service.



We told decision makers what is needed.



We told Members of the Scottish Parliament what needs to be in the Bill about the National Care Service.



We worked with groups and boards.



Some groups are Scottish Government groups.





They look at things like the law and inspection.



One group is about Personal
Assistants for Self Directed
Support.





We worked with the disabled people's campaign to Stop Care Tax.





This is about ending the money that people have to pay for social care support.





Employment

Disabled people still have barriers to getting a job.





We told the Scottish

Government that all the
projects to help people get a
job have to work for disabled
people too.

They have to be accessible.






Covid 19

We told them that it was hard for disabled people to get health services, and things like food.






Human Rights

Disabled people have human rights.







We worked with the Scottish
Government's **Human Rights Advisory Board.**

This is to help them to get ready for a new law that will put our human rights into Scots law.



We told them that disabled people need equal access to justice.

We need justice when our rights have not been met.



Making real changes

Our projects worked to make changes in practice.





We have projects about employment and about getting elected.



Employment





Our **We Can Work** internship programme supported disabled people into jobs.





We helped disabled people into work with internships.





Our "**Employerability**" project helps employers.

We trained employers on how to be good employers for disabled people.



We also helped other projects who are part of Fair Start Scotland.





Access to Elected Office Fund



We helped political parties and disabled people who were candidates for the parties.





We told parties how to make politics more accessible for everyone.

22 candidates were voted into elected office.



Research

Inclusion Scotland did more research this year about disabled people's experiences.





We found out that some disabled people can't pay for electricity to run equipment at home.



This is equipment for things like moving about and breathing.
